We are camped in a beautiful park with gas lights all around us and in the walks, and fine shade trees. My tent is under a large magnolia, and the poorest private we have sleeps under a rose bush. There is every kind of tropical fruit in abundance, and some I never saw before. Niggers bring us every morning melons of more varieties than I ever thought it possible to grow, and ripe, rich figs, peaches, apples, pomegranates, and a fruit which they call nectarine—a cross between the plum and the peach—and very fine eating; and then we have every kind of vegetable imaginable. We are getting oranges and lemons from New Orleans and plenty of ice—a great luxury."

Rebel Reports from Charleston, TWO DAYS HEAVY BOMBARDMENT.

Monitors Engage Cummings' Point, Rebels Bombard Gilmore's Works.

The Richmond Way of August 1st has been received here and contains the following: CHARLESTON, July 31.—Cummings' Point was severely bombarded yesterday morning.

The Great Fire at Havana, Nearly \$2,000,000 Property Destroyed.

EVERYBODY here is talking about the great fire. Sixteen large stores were entirely destroyed.

There was also burned large lots of hardware, horse shoes, medicines, gin, saltpetre, nitre, percussion caps, sulphur, &c.

There were also consumed 63,012 boxes of sugar, valued at \$1,184,216. Total losses estimated at \$1,618,163, but this is decidedly an underestimate.

The French transport Milan was the first to send ammunition, and their example was followed by other Spanish men-of-war.

NEWS OF THE PIRATES, VESSELS IN PURSUIT.

The bark Daniel Webster, Capt. Robb, which arrived to-day, brings advices from Bahia to July 4. The rebel private steamers Georgia and Alabama, sailed from Bahia May 24.

The U. S. ship Onward sailed about May 26th on a cruise.

Arrival of the Arabia.

The Steamship Arabia, from Liverpool 1 P. M. 25th and Queenston 26th, arrived at 4.30 P. M. to-day.

The Marine Insurance Company had reported a loss of \$150,000 by the capture of the steamship B. F. Harris.

The Army and Navy Gazette thinks that with Grant's army free to operate with Rosecrans there is no ground for speaking hopefully of the prospects of the Confederacy unless Lee is able to reverse their mistakes by a great victory.

It was informed the American government took note of the value of every vessel captured and debited it to Her Majesty's government.

Mr. Lyard, referring more particularly to the case of the Alabama, said everything had been done in broad daylight.

Lord Palmerston defended the course of the government, and said he could see no distinction in principle between selling arms to the Federals and selling ships to the Confederates.

Mr. Cobden was prevented, on a point of order, from reading a letter from Gideon Wells in Parliament.
