## Lee Lauman Presented With Special Award

Adam Henry Lee Lauman, Westboro, Mo., was presented the Distinguished Voyageur Award for 1986 on Sunday, Nov. 16. He is a member of Voiture 1402 of the 40 & 8 and Post 49 of the American Legion in Tarkio. He was presented the award by Wayne Gregory, Grand Chef De Gare Du Missouri at the Mo-Kan Wreck in Tarkio. The award is given annually to World War I veterans who have given their time and effort in promoting the 40 & 8 and the American Legion.

Born on Dec. 23, 1894, Lauman has farmed the land and lived in the house that he was born in in the Farmers City area west of Westboro. His father came to this area from the old country.

he has been one of the faithful leaders throughout his lifetime.

Inducted into the army Feb. 26, 1918, Lauman was a member of the Wagoner Supply Company of the 89 Division of the 354th Infantry. He served in this capacity during the St. Mihiel Offensive from Sept. 12 to Sept. 16, 1918. He was also in the fighting at the Muese Argonne Offensive from Oct. 19 to Nov. 11, 1918. This was one of the fiercest battles of World War I.

Lauman was discharged June 3, 1919, at Camp Funston, Kan. In 1980 he retired from farming, turning the farming duties on his farm over to his daughter and her husband. He now lives at Fair Oaks Senior Center in Rock Port, Mo.
