CORONA CARS MAY COME IN ON MARKET

Pacific Electric Is Making Connection at Fourteenth Street—Plans for Suburban Traffic on This Street Rapidly Developing

There is every reason to believe that the Pacific Electric intends running its through cars from Los Angeles to Corona when the Market street line is completed.

Also it looks very much like the Corona cars will come into Riverside by the way of Market street, thus relieving the local traffic on Main street.

While no official statement has been made, the fact that the company is now at work making its connections from the Riverside, Rialto & Pacific at Market and First streets and at Fourteenth and Magnolia avenue indicates that the company intends running its through trains on the Market street tracks.

The track at First and Market is about completed. At Fourteenth and Magnolia avenue the new switch is already in and the new grade has been cut to Fourteenth street from a point where the connection with the Magnolia avenue line is made.

At present the city is delaying the work at Fourteenth street by reason of having to lay a pipe line on the new street. Once this is in the company will be able to continue its line north to Tenth street, the present terminus of the old Southern Pacific railroad tracks.

The Market street station of the Southern Pacific will be used as a passenger station by the Pacific Electric.

Another piece of work to be done by the Pacific Electric is the converting of the old engine house at Market and Fifth streets into a freight station. It is the intention of the company to operate two trains each night between Los Angeles and Riverside and perhaps Corona.



